The HMS Hermes Standard was dedicated but central to the occasion, as ever, were the bereaved families 18 of whom received the Elizabeth Cross in recognition of their fallen loved one. Sir Hew and Lady Pike were our principal guests and we listened to the Right Reverend Stephen Cottrell, Bishop of Reading, preach a moving sermon.

The scene had been set the previous Friday by a beautifully delivered Floral Masterclass demonstration organised by the Chapel Flower Guild and evidenced by the magnificent altar floral tribute for us all to enjoy. You can see a full report on page six.

As always the orchestration of our special day with old friends and new was superb due in no small measure to the Headmaster, College Team and pupils who care so deeply for the Chapel throughout the year. They demonstrate a constant appreciation of its presence in their midst by using it to great effect for their own services, choral society events and as a facility for outside charities.

10TH ANNIVERSARY ANNUAL SERVICE - 2010

ANNUAL SERVICE ON SUNDAY JUNE 13TH 2010



There was hardly a spare seat at the Falklands Chapel June Service at Pangbourne which celebrated the 10th Anniversary of the Chapel's opening. About two hundred bereaved family members were joined by more than 380 SAMA veterans and veteran reunion groups and associations in remembering those who lost their lives in 1982.

Within the usual Service format was the poignant presentation of Elizabeth Cross Medals & Scrolls to eighteen families by appropriate Commanding Officers or their representatives. The first 5 crosses were presented by Lt General Sir Hew Pike CO of 3 Para in 1982 to Mrs Sara Jones for Lt Colonel H Jones VC OBE CO of 2 Para, Miss Melanie Jane McKay for Sergeant Ian McKay VC 3 Para, Mr David Tarbard for Sapper Wayne Tarbard 9 Para Squadron Royal Engineers, Mr Richard Jones for Private CE Jones 3 Para, and Mrs Ann Townsend & Mr David Grose for Private Neil Grose 3 Para.

The next two crosses were presented by Brigadier Johnny Rickett CO of 1st Battalion Welsh Guards in 1982 to Mr Ray Poole for Guardsman Gareth Wyn Poole 1st Battalion Welsh Guards and Mrs Diane Sumnall for Lance Corporal Frank Ward 1st Battalion Welsh Guards.

Captain David Hart-Dyke CO HMS Coventry in 1982 presented the Elizabeth Cross to Mrs Iris Hall for Weapons Engineering Mechanic 1st Class Ian Peter Hall RN HMS Coventry, Mrs Rosalind Balfour for Lt Cdr David Balfour RN HMS Sheffield & Mrs Anne Woodhead for Lt Cdr John S Woodhead DSC RN HMS Sheffield.

Mrs Sara Jones, in her capacity as Chairman of the Falkland Families Association, presented the medal to Mrs Yvonne Robinson for Weapons Engineering Artificer Ian R Williams RN **HMS** Coventry. The next six crosses were presented by Admiral Sir Michael Layard Senior Naval Officer SS Atlantic Conveyor in 1982 to Mrs Kate McCabe for Captain Ian North DSC, MN Master SS Atlantic Conveyor, Mrs Sally Eyton -Jones for Lt Cdr John Eyton-Jones RN, 801 Naval Air Squadron, Mr Alfred and Mrs Rose Anslow for Adrian J Anslow Engineering Mechanic (Radio) 1st Class RN 845 Naval Air Squadron, Mr Donald and Mrs Marian Pryce for Leading Air Engineering Mechanic 1st Class RN DL Pryce 845 Naval Air Squadron and Mrs Joan Marsden for Naval Airman Brian Marsden RN HMS Invincible and Mrs Diana Batt for Lt Cdr Gordon WJ Batt DSC RN.

The last medal was presented by Major General Julian Thompson Royal Marines Commander 3 Commando Brigade in 1982 to Mrs Elaine Howieson for Corporal K Evans 45 Commando Royal Marines. After the Service the families gathered at the Cairn for souvenir photographs of each presentation which were framed & sent to them later.

The Bishop of Reading, The Rt. Reverend Stephen Cottrell blessed the HMS Hermes Association Standard at a brief altar ceremony during the Service, witnessed by a large group of veterans of HMS Hermes seated in the front row of the gallery.

At the buffet lunch in Drake Hall after the Service Chairman of the Chapel Trustees Rear Admiral Jeremy Sanders welcomed the many families & veterans and paid tribute to the large group of Chapel Friends present and some of the original benefactors & facilitators who had joined the gathering for the 10th Anniversary celebration. He also expressed appreciation of the eight Standard Bearers from HMS Invincible Association, HMS Glamorgan, HMS Vincent, HMS Antrim, RBL Dorking, Merchant Navy Association HMS Hermes and Taunton, new Standard Bearer Steve Kay for SAMA'82 and congratulated SAMA veteran Keith 'Paddy' Burton whose moving rendition of the Lament on his bagpipes have become an intrinsic part of this memorable annual service.



MAGICAL FLORISTRY!



Centrepeice for 13th June

International floral art designer John Chennell provided onlookers with a fascinating and imaginative demonstration of his skills at a flower arranging Masterclass in the Chapel on June 11th. His repertoire of seven floral displays ranged from the traditional to the extraordinary, all linked to the Chapel or the Falkland Islands in some way. John started by demonstrating a traditional display crafted from garden foliage such as philadelphus, sennecio, Solomons Seal, Ivy, & Grasses studded with pale pink roses and Lizianthus.

Next came a stunning 'tribute to the albatross' for which he constructed a stylised arrangement using an old Strelizia leaf for the head, willow pieces for the wings Formium leaves for the tail and green Beech for the body bulk. This basis was then enhanced with a mixture of Solomon's Seal and variegated Horse Radish leaves embellished with a confection of palest pinky cream roses and brown anthurium florets for balance. A stunning effect!

He then moved on to providing a stunning interpretation of the Chapel's Memorial Window in gorgeous hues of blues & purples – delphiniums, hydrangeas, aliums and abutilon – interspersed with silver leafed 'Lambs Ears' or Stachys.

Sunrise & Sunset were the chosen themes for the next two displays; the former had a basis of coconut leaves 'snaked' onto a wooden frame and filled with foliage of golden privet or euonymous and Mexican orangeblossom in which he placed yellow gerbera and rose flowerheads; Sunset had an amazing canoe shaped basis across which John constructed a swathe of copper beech branches studded with orange datura, gerberas & roses. You could almost see the sun going down.

Last, but not least he unveiled a centrepiece of garden flowers to remain in the Chapel for the 13th June Service of Remembrance & Thanksgiving. A prize draw of all the other arrangements raised a wonderful £1,000 for the Chapel Trust.

At the conclusion of his animated presentation John gave several useful tips including how to stop rose heads (and other flowers with wooded stems) wilting in a display: immerse cut stem in boiling water to one inch for 10 seconds to get rid of any airlock – as a result you will have no wilting roses! Something we've all wanted to know.....

BEST LETTER OF THE YEAR!



NEW GOVERNOR VISITS CHAPEL I

Before leaving for the Islands in October the new Governor designate of the Falkland Islands - Nigel Haywood CVO - paid a visit to the Chapel and met up with College Headmaster Thomas Garnier and Bursar Ron Obbard. His tour of the Chapel included signing the Visitors Book and viewing the refurbished Memorial side-room complete with new ash furniture, an updated SAMA Garden of Remembrance and two digital photo-frames containing a diary of photos of many of the floral arrangements and tributes from the Flower Guild Festivals over the years and a catalogue of photographs taken by Falkland Islander Norman Clarke which were previously on display at the Imperial War Museum (see front page). The originals of the latter were donated to the Chapel by Mr Clarke whose Falklands '82 Trust shared the funding of the refurbishment programme with the Honorable Company of Master Mariners. In addition the Governor was able to enjoy the now complete model ships' display featuring the Falklands Flotilla donated in 2009 by Robin McGarel-Brigadier Groves.

SAMA82 PLAN MEMORIAL AT THE NATIONAL MEMORIAL ARBORETUM

The SAMA(82) Trustees are planning to go ahead with the construction of a Falklands War Memorial at the Association site, dedicated in 2007, in the National Memorial Arboretum at Alrewas. The memorial will be built by firm of stonemasons who have built a number of outstanding military memorials in the NMA. The dedication ceremony is planned for May 2012 and fundraising will begin imminently.

It is intended that the Memorial will reflect the Falklands landscape, be distinctive amongst other memorials of marble and fine stone, and create a sense of being within the memorial rather than looking in from the outside.

This will be achieved by reflecting the style and materials used in the San Carlos Cemetery, with which many veterans are familiar.

BOOK REVIEW

Over the past twenty eight years we have had every book imaginable about the fighting of the Falklands War. Now at last here comes one from a very different point of view. Nicci Pugh was one of the senior nurses on board the Hospital Ship Uganda, and she has written a fascinating account of what happened on board. Uganda was a P & O cruise ship specializing in school tours in the Mediterranean. Within a week in April 1982 she was converted into a hospital ship in Gibraltar with 90 tons of stores flown out from UK and was scrubbed from top to bottom to make her clean - a lesson modern hospitals could

As a Hospital Ship, Uganda could not receive military information and had to stay within a designated Red Cross Box. They therefore had to rely on the BBC World Service for news of what was happening. This sense of isolation permeates the book. Most famously, she was not told where any minefields had been laid (military information) and so managed to steam clear through one when entering Port Stanley at the end of the fighting! Uganda was in a bubble of its own, and the staff on board fought their battles in the operating theatre,

burns unit, ICU and wards rather than on Mount Tumbledown or at Goose Green. But the battles were there nonetheless. As a simple example all of the beds sent out had wheels on them and tended to move with

the ships motion - not ideal. Supplies of blood were likely to be a problem as it has a shelf life of 35 days, and so most supplies had to come from within the Task Force. However, donors need 48 hours to recover from giving blood, and once the troops had landed donor sessions would be impossible. 415 pints were taken before troops landed and Uganda used 298 - one patient receiving over 50. The fact is that all of these battles were won and only three, of the 730 admitted, died, a remarkable record, matched only by Commander Rick Jolly's ADS at Ajax Bay. Incidentally, 150 of those 730 were Argentinean and they were dealt with just the same as anybody else.



However, the book is more than just a story of how Uganda was operated. Throughout, Nicci Pugh has used the testimony of nurses, crew and patients to make the story more personal. Whether it is the recollections of the

RN Pathologist, Mark Trasler, or a fellow nurse, Maggie Freer, illustrating how they overcame problems, or the memories of a patient, they are vivid and moving. Amongst the best are those of Denzil Connick, whose memories start with being wounded on Mount Longdon, and who has vivid recollection of his time on board. Throughout there are pictures, usually taken by the author herself, even if (to nit pick) some are repeated.

The last part of the book tells the story of Uganda after she was returned to P & O and was later sold for scrap, and then the story of how Nicci Pugh became involved with SAMA82, organizing a

reunion on board P & O's Aurora in April 2008 for all those who had served on board Uganda as staff, crew or patient. She has written a most moving book which rounds off our knowledge of the Falklands War. The professionalism and superb competence of our fighting troops was more than matched by that of their nursing and medical staff, and this book shows it to the full.
