Of particular significance were her visits for the 25th Anniversary Service Remembrance Thanksgiving in 2007 and for the College Centenary in 2017, accompanied by

His Royal Highness, The Duke of Edinburgh on one of his last official forays. As we reflect on her remarkable reign with gratitude for the example she set for us all, we also remember her unwavering commitment and support of our Armed Forces, in particular that given to the Falklands Task Force in 1982. Her Majesty will be deeply missed by us all, and now we offer our best wishes for the future to her son, King Charles III.

After 22 years as a Chapel Trustee, Major General Alastair Bruce OBE KStJ VR DL has retired. On 12th June, Chairman Jeff Mason was able to tell the assembled veterans and families something of his huge contribution over many years. "Alastair is a man of creative

ideas" said General Jeff. "He conceived the 'Stones from Home' project, where families and visitors were invited to bring a memorial stone to the Chapel, and over time so many were brought that the Cairn was built and 'topped off' by Her Majesty the Queen in 2007. He also suggested providing

the tented nave for anniversaries so that no one need be turned away. He was always 'brimming' with ideas and we shall miss him. We thank him wholeheartedly for all that he has done."

I subsequently joined the Royal Navy in 1998, as a Marine Engineer Officer, and have twice deployed to the Falkland Islands. An even stronger connection is that my father was the Marine Engineer Officer on board HMS COVENTRY, and thankfully he returned safely to the UK, on 11 June 1982, following her sinking. Having completed my final sea assignment, on board HMS QUEEN ELIZABETH, I

Paul Hailwood Rides in memory of brother Chris

Paul Hailwood's story in his own words.....

'Thank you to everyone at the Falklands Chapel for their generosity and support of my charity challenge in aid of Combat Stress. On 8th June my 160 mile circular cycle ride included Falklands War Memorials at Marchwood, Pangbourne, Old Portsmouth, and Lee-on-the-Solent. each I laid a small cross for my brother Chris who was lost on RFA Sir Galahad, 40 years to the day. At the time I was on the other side of the Islands in San Carlos Water serving on RFA OLNA as a 19 year old Deck Cadet.'

'It was a long day starting at 04:00, avoiding the busy traffic and heading through Southampton to Marchwood then turning north to Pangbourne. My son and his girlfriend surprised me 'en route' and joined in for the leg from Whitchurch to Pangbourne. It was good to get to the chapel about midday and have my first proper rest.



The chapel provided the perfect place to pay my respects and to reflect on the life-changing events of 40 years ago. After a good lunch it was a push back into Hampshire and the toughest section climbing over the South Downs. Once that was achieved it was plain sailing to Old Portsmouth and finally Leeon-the-Solent, arriving at 21:30, where my lovely wife Janet was waiting to scoop me up.'

'Due to the incredible kindness of my ride sponsors, a total of £2,482 was raised for Combat Stress. I was even interviewed on BBC Radio 2's Jeremy Vine show which was a massive way to raise awareness of the work of the charity. It was a big challenge for me, but nothing compared to those who lost their lives and those who still struggle with mental health issues today. Thank you all for helping me to do something positive on this 40 year anniversary of the Falklands War'.











40TH ANNIVERSARY DAY OF REMEMBRANCE

A Truly Wonderful Day - 12th June 2022

40 years after the events in the South Atlantic, the memories for those involved and for the families who lost sons, husbands and brothers remained as clear as the chimes of a ship's bell when a gathering of a thousand worshipped together in the Falklands Islands Memorial Chapel on Sunday 12th June. The 40th Anniversary Service, which had taken months of careful preparation by the Chapel Trustees and College team, was one of the major events that took place throughout the UK during June 2022 to commemorate the lives and sacrifice of the 255 Servicemen and 3 civilians who were lost when the British Task Force sailed South to regain the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands for its grateful inhabitants.

The Chapel Chairman and Trustees were pleased to welcome His Royal Highness The Duke of Kent as Guest of Honour; also present were Mr James Puxley the Lord Lieutenant of Berkshire, accompanied by his wife, Mrs Deborah Puxley, and Admiral Lord West, President of the Chapel Trust. Branches of the military were represented by senior officers, including Admiral Sir Philip Jones, for the 1st Sea Lord, Air Chief Marshal Sir Andy Pulford, for the Chief of the Air Staff, Major General Alastair Bruce, for the Chief of the General Staff and Chapel Chairman Major General Jeff Mason for the Commandant Royal Marines. Vivien Foster OBE was present to represent the Merchant Navy Association, and MLA Roger Spink and his partner Helena represented the Falkland Islands Government Legislative Assembly, accompanied by UK representative Richard Hyslop and his wife, Venetia. The 12th June being the anniversary upon which HMS Glamorgan was hit by an enemy Exocet, Admiral Sir Ian Forbes KCB CBE was invited to perform the Act of Remembrance. For the first time, there were two Bishops in attendance: The Right Reverend Hugh Nelson, Bishop to the Armed Forces, was joined by his Roman Catholic counterpart, The Right Reverend Paul Mason. Bishop Hugh delivered a fitting Address (*), based on the importance of Remembrance and "how by understanding and learning from the past, we can live wisely today and into the future". Bishop Paul led the intercessions. Superb music was provided by the Pangbourne Choir, joined by the Ensemble of the Band of the Royal Marines.

The Chapel played host to an extra 400 guests, made possible by the provision of a tented nave attached to its main entrance. Never before had the College catered for so many in what was the largest marquee that many of us had ever seen! But they did, superbly well, and it proved to be a most memorable occasion, with plaudits received from numerous attendees. The marquee was arranged with banks of flag decorated tables and many of the reunion groups reserved space so that their associated families would be able to sit with them. These arrangements worked well, and many attendees were happily reunited with people they had not seen in years. The camaraderie was palpable, and the vision was uplifting. As Commander Alan Watt (HMS GLAMORGAN '82 Association) commented afterwards: "We had an amazing bonus for GLAMORGAN when, unexpectedly, the family of Brian Hinge spotted us and



joined us for lunch; we are so pleased that they found us because we had not met before." Addressing the assembled during lunch, Trust Chairman Major General Jeff Mason announced two retirements: that of Trustee, Major General Alastair Bruce OBE, after 22 years, and that of 'Paddy the Piper' Keith Burton RM who has faithfully piped the Lament at every Annual Service for the past 12 years. He also paid tribute to Sadie Clare, retired Flower Guild Chairman, and her volunteer helpers Sue Hollebone and Richard Stone.

General Mason went on to say how pleased he was to see so many families, and veteran reunions at the Chapel again. He thanked the Headmaster, Thomas Garnier, the Chaplain and the College team for their









excellent organisation of the day, in support of the Chapel Secretary. He thanked those founder benefactors present who had helped raise funds to build the Chapel, all those years ago, including Sir John Madejski, Freddie Forsyth, and Lord Sterling. Finally, he observed that "we have been able to stage this huge anniversary event only due to the supreme generosity of many Falkland Islands companies, and connected to the Islands, who responded generously to Trustee Sukey Cameron's call for help. Thank you to all of them".

After the Service, Trustee and former Equerry Brigadier Charles Page escorted His Royal Highness on a short tour; of particular interest were the bronze albatross sculptures beside the Chapel, sculpted by Mark Coreth who in 1982 was a Lieutenant in the Blues and Royals attached to the Scots Guards and heavily involved in the Battle of Mount Tumbledown. Then on to the Memorial Cairn, where HRH met retiring Trustee Major General Alastair Bruce OBE, and laid a special stone from the Falklands on the top of the Cairn; he explained that each stone represented an individual who was killed in the Falklands and that the Queen had 'topped off' the Memorial Cairn in 2007, marking 25 years since the war. The Royal party then moved on to the Memorial

Garden where the Duke was introduced to Trustee Rear Admiral Dick Melly who had overseen the programme to install memorial plaques designed and sponsored by many of the ships, units, regiments and battalions which had taken part in the Task Force to mark the Anniversary. Also presented to His Royal Highness was Trustee Sukey Cameron, formerly representative of the Falklands Government (UK), escorting a group of major donors and their wives including Mr Phil Bentley (MITIE), Mr Tom Swales (Stanley Services), Mr Saul Pitaluga (Colonel Equipment Finance), Mr Joost Pompert (Fortuna Ltd), Mr Howard Pullen (Howland & Partners), Commodore Adrian Bell (RN & RM Charity), Major General Tim Hyams CB OBE (ABF the Soldiers Charity) and Mr Freddie Forsyth.


40TH ANNIVERSARY



40TH ANNIVERSARY VISITORS

29 Field Battery Group visits Chapel

On Saturday 19th November members of the 29 (Corunna) Field Battery Royal Artillery led by Major General Bill Moore CBE reunited at the Chapel for the dedication of the Battery plaque that they had sponsored in the Memorial Garden to commemorate the 40th Anniversary of the Falklands War. The dedication was conducted by Reverend Neil Jeffers after a short Act of Remembrance. General Moore tells us their story in his own words...

'29 (Corunna) Field Battery Royal Artillery was part of 4th Field Regiment stationed in Aldershot and mainly recruited from the Sunderland area. In 1982 the Battery supported the 2nd Battalion the Parachute Regiment (2 Para). On deployment, the battery would split into the Tac Group (which deployed as an integral part of 2 Para) and the Gun Group which would support 2 Para and other battalions as required.

The Battery was recalled from leave on 16 April and embarked on MV Norland with 2 Para on 26 April 1982. The Battery Commander – Tony Rice – flew to Ascension with CO 2 Para (H Jones) to enable planning. The MV Norland* joined the rest of the fleet at Ascension Island and the Battery deployed into San Carlos early on D Day on 21 May 1982. The Tac Group – Tony Rice, James Watson (A Company), Bob Ash (B Company) and Alan Bullock (D Company) and

their teams were embedded in 2 Para and fought with them in the battles for Goose Green and Wireless Ridge. In the former Tony took command of 2 Para when H Jones was killed and remained in charge until Chris Keeble was able to move to a position where he could effectively take over. Much of what they learned at Goose Green was put into practice to great effect on Wireless Ridge.

In the Gun Group, David Gibbins - the Battery 2IC initially deployed with the guns and became a Forward Air Controller (as a battlefield casualty replacement) for the battles around Stanley. Bill Moore was the Gun Position Officer, and Tom Martin the Command Post Officer for the 6 Light Guns and 120 men. In the final battles the guns mainly supported 3 Para (Mount Longdon) and The Scots Guards (Tumbledown) where the Battery fired over 3,700 rounds. Their story is captured in Tom Martin's book "Falkland's Gunner" published in 2017**. All those in the photograph returned to the Falkland Islands in 2017.

The Battery team remains a close knit community and the 40th anniversary of the conflict has enabled reunions.

Nicci and Denzil on BBC Wales!

On Ash Wednesday, March 2022 BBC Wales arranged to interview veterans Nicci Pugh and Denzil Connick in the Falklands Chapel for the 40th Anniversary. Former nurse Nicci was deployed on board SS UGANDA and latterly wrote 'White Ship – Red Crosses' of which there is a copy in the Chapel Library. Denzil is a BLESMA member and former patient of the hospital ship; he was seriously injured with 3 Para

on Mount Longdon on 13th June 1982, losing one leg during the attack, and almost the other. Denzil was a main contributor to Nicci's book. They are seen here with Reverend Neil Jeffers presenting him with a newer, commemorative, hardback version of 'White Ship-Red Crosses' for the Chapel Library. During their visit they were able to view the new commemorative plaques in the Memorial Garden including that of SS UGANDA.





Throughout the 40th Anniversary the support provided by their Government, institutions and companies for events and projects has been testament to the enduring gratitude of the Falkland Islanders to our wonderful Armed Forces. Certainly the 40th Anniversary Service at the

Chapel could not have taken place without the generosity of all those listed here to whom the Trustees are eternally grateful. It merits special mention that one company - MITIE Group plc (building services) - supported the appeal with a priceless 'gift in kind' which was, in fact, to carry out much of the external refurbishment around Chapel. This included renewing all the external lighting, laying new 'hoggin' on some Chapel pathways and replacing the cracked paving on the Chapel forecourt. Thank you to you all!

Memorial Garden Transformed

The planned commemorative project to transform the circular Memorial Garden, which lies adjacent to the Chapel, is now excellent progress. making Twenty six organisations have come forward over the course of the 40th Anniversary year to sponsor plaques, including the Chapel Trustees themselves who have sponsored a plaque honouring the Falkland Islanders. This latter plaque is in recognition of the assistance provided by the islanders to HM Forces in 1982 and for their subsequent generous support of families, veterans and the Chapel.



NEWS FROM THE FALKLANDS

City Status for Stanley

In May 2022, Stanley the capital of the Falklands Islands became the first Overseas Territory to be granted official city status by Her Majesty The Queen, in this case as part of Platinum Jubilee celebration, following a rigorous assessment process of all 39 applications. It is even more special given that 2022 celebrates the first British monarch to reach 70 years on the throne, as well as the 40th anniversary of the Falkland Islands War.

MLA Pete Biggs said: "We are utterly thrilled to have been chosen for this very rare

award. This celebration of her extraordinary reign comes at a time when we in the Falkland Islands are equally reflecting on an extraordinary time in our own history. For our small community it was an unprecedented time, but I am delighted that, 40 years on from those dark days, we are being recognised in this way - I think it goes to show just how far we have come in that time, building a thriving, prosperous nation, which continually looks to the future while respecting our past."





The Princess Royal re-visits the Islands for the 40th

Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal paid her fourth visit to the Falkland Islands from 17th November for six days. Accompanied by her husband, Vice Admiral Sir Timothy Laurence, she undertook a very busy programme of events which included laying a wreath at the Liberation Monument; visiting the 1982 battlefield sites and the British Cemetery at Blue Beach; seeing the wildlife at Sea Lion Island and Bleaker Island; attending a reception for veterans and civilians; visiting a Multi-Cultural Day at Goose

Green and a Community Day at Mount Pleasant Complex; attending a dinner hosted by the Legislative Assembly; and visiting the Historic Dockvard Museum. Whilst in Stanley, Her Royal Highness also unveiled a plaque on Victory Green, marking award of City status to Stanley by Her Majesty the Queen in the Platinum Jubilee Civic Honours Competition. On her final day in Stanley, she planted a tree in the Memorial Wood, as part of the Queen's Green Canopy Platinum Jubilee Project.


A New Governor for the Islands

to seeing as much as I can of these beautiful Islands while we strive for a peaceful, secure, and prosperous future for the people of the Falkland Islands."

Ms Blake had previous postings as HM Ambassador to Kabul (2019-2021) and as High Commissioner to Dhaka (2016 to 2019).

The ceremony was followed by a parade at Victory Green with a Guard of Honour consisting of a tri-service detachment of Royal Navy, Army, and Royal Air Force and a detachment from the Falkland Islands Defence Force, and a 17 gun-salute.

A Fearless Encounter

On a windy Sunday October 30th in Sallyport, Portsmouth HMS FEARLESS veteran Commander John Prime, also representing Rear Admiral Jeremy Larken DSO RN and Captain John Kelly OBE RN, donated a copy of the HMS FEARLESS Falklands 40th Anniversary Anthology and presented a cheque for £1,000 raised from the sales of the book to Rear Admiral Dick Melly, a Trustee of the Falkland Islands Memorial Chapel Trust. The occasion was the 40th Anniversary Rededication of the Falklands Memorial Stone and Benches, which now includes plaques commemorating all 258 Service personnel and civilians who made the ultimate sacrifice during the 1982 war, rather than being limited to the Royal and Merchant Navies. The ceremony was attended by around 50 Falklands veterans, The Lord Mayor of Portsmouth, Councillor Hugh Mason and the Deputy Chaplain of the Fleet,

BOOK REVIEWS

There are not enough books about the contribution of the Merchant Navy to the Falklands War. It is a simple fact that without the Ships Taken Up From Trade (STUFT) the Task Force could never have delivered liberation, whether it was the big liners, or the smallest tugs, the container ships or the cruise ships. MV Norland was in 'ordinary life' a Ro-Ro ferry ploughing the North Sea between Hull and the coastal ports of Belgium, Holland and France, but her voyage in 1982 and 1983 is a vivid example of what those Merchant Marine ships went through, and it is valuable because of the scarcity of such volumes.

Reg Kemp would say that he was just an 'ordinary' bloke, doing an 'ordinary' job as a night steward, married with two children, but as the book unfolds it becomes clear that he is not 'ordinary' at all. Firstly, the crew were offered the option of going to the South Atlantic, and a number, perfectly reasonably, decided not to go. Kemp is well aware of the Merchant Navy's history in both world wars, making a number of acute references to it, and so accepted the dangers likely to be there. Secondly, and this is at the heart of the book, he established very good relations with the troops carried down to the Islands, principally 2 Para. He vastly admires the 'Toms' and their NCOs, and he even accepts their officers! This is to touch a raw point. Kemp has few problems in accepting orders from his own officers, but finds it difficult to accept them from Royal Navy personnel, or to accept that in combat the latter must have the final say. Army officers are rarely acceptable, aside from those in 2 Para, and as for the 3rd Service, words fail him. He is, of course, limited to those he came across on Norland. He paints a delightful picture of many of his colleagues, and how they managed to cope with the strains and stresses of combat. The account of disembarking 2 Para in San Carlos Bay is gripping, as is his account of what might be called The Battle of Bomb Alley, as the Argentine air force tried to halt the invasion.

One might have expected that at the end of the conflict Norland would have taken troops back to the UK, but not a bit of it. After some leave back in Britain (half the crew at a time) she was used to act as a ferry again, but this time between Ascension Island



and Port Stanley. As a result, Kemp got to know quite a lot of the islanders, particularly those who frequented the Globe Tavern. He did not find all of the troops being ferried out garrison islands the easy, the civilians nor accompanying them to build the new airport. This went on for well over a year, until troop carrying planes could land. However, he is much moved by the farewell given to Norland by Major General David Thorne and by the Royal Navy as they leave for Hull. Norland was eventually scrapped, but Kemp remains in touch with fellow Merchant Navv

veterans as well as 2 Para, and the book ends with an elegiac trip back to the Falklands in 2014, in a chapter entitled 'Laying Ghosts to Rest'. I feel sure that he did, and it is a moving tale that he tells.

This is warmly recommended to anybody who wants to understand the Merchant Marine's involvement in the campaign. Idiosyncratic, personable, occasionally indiscrete but with his heart totally in the right place, this book deserves a wide readership.

and this volume, written by bugler Brian Short tells their amazing story.

His style is relaxed, with frequent asides to his readers commenting at times that this is his book and he'll write it how he likes! He introduces us to the Royal Marine Band Service, explaining their role, their training and their view of life, and explains how the news of the Argentinian invasion gradually crept up on them. On Easter leave,

like many others, the Commando Forces Band was hastily recalled to Stonehouse Barracks, Plymouth and told they were going to war initially as attached troops to the Commando Medical Squadron. One RM colonel, having seen them perform well during the firemen's strike, suggested they 'should just go along', and be an asset to the Task Force.

So 'off to war they went' initially as an extra work force, involved in the mammoth task of moving boxes of compo rations for the entire Task Force. The voyage south was relatively slow and the embarked troops needed fitness training and entertainment. What better for the latter than an RM band? Sure enough they performed in jazz and classical quartet, full jazz band and every combination they could think of. They were vastly appreciated both by the troops as well as the civilian crew.

When Canberra arrived at San Carlos Bay their real work began transferring casualties to newly created hospital facilities, and comforting them. In a most moving passage Brian Short describes how he spoke reassuringly to a casualty who appeared to be unconscious. When he recovered, he told the author that he remembered every word he had said. Another task was guarding Argentinian prisoners. Not having their own weapons there was a hurried request to HMS FEARLESS which provided them with a motley collection of single pieces. After the Argentinian surrender, Canberra was used to transport the surviving enemy troops back home, and Short contrasts the subdued welcome they received at an obscured southern port, with the tumultuous welcome at Portsmouth that Canberra received. That voyage home with all three RM Commandos aboard and a triumphant beating of retreat passed in something of an alcoholic haze, but there is no hiding his pride as Canberra's PA announced "Canberra's Royal Marine Band, Your Royal Marine Band, our Royal Marine Band".

Apart from telling a marvellous story this book is a ringing endorsement of military bands. The contribution that the Royal Marine Commando Forces Band made to the Falklands War is priceless in terms of monetary value or military achievement; but it contributed notably nonetheless, and should be more than a mere footnote. Brian Short's book achieves this wonderfully well and is warmly recommended.
